What are the effects of lead poisoning?



- Permanent brain damage
- Lower IQ
- Hearing loss

- Learning and behavior problems
- Damage to kidneys and other organs
- Harm to a pregnant woman's unborn baby

HOW DO CHILDREN GET LEAD POISONING?

- Homes built before 1978 probably contain lead paint.
- Peeling or deteriorated paint creates dust. This dust settles in living areas and on toys.
- Children get lead in their bodies when they put their hands or toys in their mouths and swallow the lead dust.
- Lead hazards can come from home renovation projects, bare soil, and jewelry, pottery, candy, and cosmetics from other countries.

WHAT CAN YOU DO?

Make sure your home is lead safe

- If you live or own property in the City of Rochester, call (585) 428-LEAD (5323) to request a FREE inspection for lead hazards.
- If you live outside Rochester city limits but in Monroe County, call (585) 325-7550 to request a FREE inspection for lead hazards.
- Grants may be available to make homes lead safe.
 Call (585) 428-LEAD or (585) 753-5087 for info.
- Use lead-safe work practices when renovating or remodeling.
- Make sure that anyone hired to do work that disturbs paint in a pre-1978 home is EPA Renovation, Repair and Painting (RRP) certified.
- Call (585) 753-5087 about Lead Safe Work
 Practices classes and EPA RRP certification before
 doing renovations or remodeling.
- Pregnant? Don't have remodeling work done in a pre-1978 home.

Get your child tested

You may not be able to see the symptoms of lead poisoning. The only way to know if a child has been exposed to lead is to get a blood lead test.

- Request a blood lead test at any well-child visit up to six years old.
- Call your child's doctor and ask what your child's blood lead test results mean.
- Pregnant? Get a blood lead test too.

Clean lead dust frequently

- Wash a child's hands and toys often, especially after playing and before eating.
- \bullet Take off your shoes when you enter your home.
- Wet wipe or mop flat surfaces and floors often with detergent and water.
- Use a vacuum with a HEPA filter to catch lead dust. Call (585) 753-5087 to borrow one from the Monroe County Health Dept.

Make sure your child eats healthy foods

Foods high in iron and calcium can help lower your child's lead risk.

- Eat whole-grain breads, beans, tuna, and green leafy vegetables like spinach for iron.
- Drink low-fat milk and eat yogurt and cheese for calcium.

IT'S THE LAW

New York State Law

It's the law that all children get a blood test for lead at ONE and AGAIN at TWO years old.

Rochester City Law

If you rent or own a home in Rochester, call (585) 428-LEAD to request a free lead inspection. You cannot be evicted for requesting a lead inspection of your home.
